

What? There's a Dog Park in Burns Lake?

It was July 1st, the sun came out and it was finally time to officially open the MacEwen Dog Park in Burns Lake.

Although the event had been delayed for over two years, due to the COVID pandemic, about 50 people and their dogs came to celebrate the day when it finally came.

"The MacEwen's dogs were their children," according to a friend of the pair, George Magee, who, during the opening ceremony related stories about the love of dogs as the reason the money given to the Rotary by the MacEwens was used to construct the park.

The site, located on Francois Lake Drive, was originally the Dick Schritt Ball Park, not used for years due to the relocation of baseball diamonds to the Eagle Creek Fairgrounds. so there was a tribute as well to Rotarian Dick Schritt. Carla Carlson, daughter of Mr. Schritt, thanked the Committee for including a memorial sign in the park to honor her father.

Lynn Synotte gave a brief history of the park's construction, and acknowledged the many financial donors and volunteers who assisted with building the park. "3000 bags have been used since opening!" she laughed. She also introduced the Committee's new maintenance worker, Logan Mailloux. Committee member Tracey Payne explained how the signs purchased by local businesses posted on the fence paid for his wages and the bags. Dog Park Committee member Heather Anchikoski cut the ribbon held by members Ricky Dobbs and Nicole Gerow to cheers and barks of onlookers.

The rain held off for the two hour event, long enough to watch Julie Harrison put her three dogs through an agility demonstration and the obstacles stayed up for dog lovers to try their own pooches on the course. Julie also stayed and answered many questions of dog owners.



Spectators munched on watermelon and pooches snacked on free treats provided by MICHELS representative, John Hunt. Dog owners also walked away with free portable doggie bowls donated by the Village of Burns Lake.

Judges saw many tricks, long tongues and tails in the in the fun contests and there were a lot of smiles as winners were awarded with dog toys and other prizes.

Contestants in the "Do You Look Like Your Dog" campaign waited patiently until the results of the

contest were announced. The 15 excellent entries received made it difficult to choose. But in the end, the \$100 first prize went to Tristan and Baxter, very cool in hats and shades. The \$50 Chamber Bucks second prize was awarded to Kieran and Goomba, who managed a look alike pose. Third prize of \$30 Chamber Bucks was won by Rene Crouse, Mindy and Echo who were all attired in black and white, and an honorable mention and \$20 worth of Chamber Bucks went to Liz, Frankie and Tesla who also wore sort of matching outfits!





Hear Our Songs, and Sing Along!

In the summer of 2012, singer / songwriter Lowry Olafson and a host of local animal lovers (and even some dogs) came together to create a theme song for LAFS. The song was called "Teach My Person How to Love Me". The original onthe-spot recording even includes a "yip!" from one of the dogs when we sang about how the vet will "give me all my shots". Now that was some good improvisation!

We thought it was awesome, and Lowry did too. Lowry created a fantastic professional studio recording complete with session drummer and backup singers. The studio and live versions went onto a CD (remember those?) complete with kids' art on the sleeve. Each of our local students got a CD, and instead of business cards, LAFS handed out those CDs for years.





As we worked on our major re-do of all our education materials during COVID, songs were a must. We once again asked Lowry to help us get them out in a fun and effective way. Lowry helped us to rework five of our existing animal care and safety songs. We also created a brandnew interactive song called "My Dog Scruff". All of our new "Critter Care Singalong Songs" turned out great, just as you would expect from a performing pro like Lowry.

And what a wonderful box of gifts, including Out of the Cold – a fantastic project described in this book. Thank you so much.


I am so grateful to the Lakes Animal Friendship Society (LAFS) as well as the students of Babine Elementary Secondary School (BESS).

Do you know about Roots & Shoots? It is very strong in Canada and does a lot of work with First Nation children.






